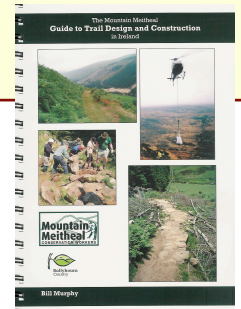
Meitheal volunteers are a keen bunch. As soon as news broke about renovating the old stalkers trail from Glenmalure up Carrawaystick, they were up and at it to get started. On 11 November a Memorandum of Understanding was signed allowing the Club to start work. Over twenty keen folk did sterling work building 92 metres of new drain. Two weeks later 16 more good people completed a further 80 metres of drain and completed a section of stone pitching. The project is an initiative of Mountain Meitheal and Wicklow Uplands Council. Shay Walsh, Chair of Mountain Meitheal, says "this is an exciting project packed with potential goodwill for both landowner and mountain users.

It's an ideal job for volunteers. We hope many more will want

to get involved. There's plenty of work whether anyone wants to join us just for a day or over a longer period." The project includes the construction of a new footbridge to facilitate recreational access to Carrawaystick, where the landowner has agreed access to his land on a strictly permissive basis. The new route will be closed for one day each year and permission is initially for a period of seven years. He reserves the right to close the route in the short term for any reason if he is ever required to do so. Wicklow County Council will provide insurance for the walk once the route has been approved to the standard accepted by the National Waymarked Ways Advisory Committee. Work resumes after the winter break on **February 25th** and everyone is welcome to help. IRELAND'S FIRST ADIRONDACK SHELTER?

In yet another first for the Club we constructed a new mountain shelter on a section of Ireland's premier walking route, The Wicklow Way in Glenamlur.

These shelters are quite common in North America and

Scandinavia where hikers use them as simple overnight accomodation. For our annual



summer weekend camp this year, we built the shelter to mark the 25th Anniversary of the Wicklow Way. Based on a disused foresters' hut, and with Coillte's permission, useable material from the old building was moved to the new site nearby. It took over 120 hours of voluntary work to construct (not including the prefabrication off site) and Mountain Meitheal spent nearly €1,100 on new materials. Despite very poor weather, a barbeque was enjoyed during building work. The project is now complete and open for

business at **Grid Reference: T093 923**.

Already many trail and mountain users have



enjoyed this rustic retreat judging by the many encouraging comments left in our visitor's book. We ask all who use the shelter to treat

it with respect and please practice the principles of "Leave No Trace"



DO YOU KNOW this old Irish proverb? - *Ar scáth a chéile a mbaireas na daoine* - "People live in one another's shelter." The Irish word *scáth*, translated here as shelter, has many meanings including: a shadow, a shade, darkness, a screen, a curtain or veil, sake (as in "for the sake of") or good (as in "for the good of"). A

group of neighbours, helping a farmer to save the turf or hay, or to finish some other work on the farm before the good weather broke, was called **a meitheal**. The group of helping neighbours, usually included the farmer's brothers or cousins or other members of the extended family. Another old proverb says -

Is fearr beagán den gbaol ná mórán den-charthanas - "A little relationship is worth a lot of charity" and the first aspect of such family connection was the duty of material help. *Combar na gCombarsan* - "co-operation



of neighbours" was a much used phrase and a much practiced act. Happily this spirit still lives on. From the first Mountain Meitheal work day near Laragh in 2002 (**pictured here**)

volunteers have been carrying out valuable trail repair work in Ireland's mountains. Next year the Club will be only **FIVE YEARS OLD** with an already very impressive list of achievements under its belt. As well as building on a pool of knowledge, the club has organised projects involving approximately 200 volunteers who have put in nearly 5,000 voluntary hours working on trails and who have completed approximately four kilometers of path repair. All this great work has saved someone or somebody many thousands of Euro compared to commercial operations. This leaves a very big unanswered question - without volunteers would any of this happened at all!
